

### From your Minister's desk

It was so good to be back in church last Sunday with the choir in full form. Old friends and new singing along with them praising our Creator, joining our hearts together as followers of Jesus. They say that “absence makes the heart grow fonder” and that’s how I was feeling.

What a luxury to have a Sabbatical spread over these last two summers, combined with holydays it really provided Lynn and I with an opportunity to rest, re-connect with family, and reflect on how Spirit has led us to this place in our lives.

We’d taken on the task of writing the founding story for Bedford House Community Ministry. It took us back seven years to when we’d first bought the house on Aylmer Street. And it took us back seven years before that when Lynn and I first met in Bobcaygeon, became friends, then colleagues, then a couple with a shared passion for learning, playing, expressing,..

We dug through journals and blogs and proposals and emails and financial statements. There are so many relationships intertwined with our story. So many stories. Trying to capture how our relationship with Spirit was central – while leaving behind all of the trappings and language of church culture – continues to be very challenging. This writing project that began as a summer’s pastime, has grown into a much bigger “work in progress”.

Our relationship with the newly amalgamated Greenwood church was central to the 2015 start-up of this experiment in community that has evolved into Bridging Teams and the Bridges Peterborough project. For me, it is so good to be rooted in the Greenwood church culture while we venture out into “being the church” beyond. A recent Facebook post expresses it like this...

*I believe churches are meant for praising God -and so are 2:00 a m car rides, showers, coffee shops, conversations with friends and strangers, etc.*

*We will never change the world if we confine our faith within a building; only going to church.*

*We need to be the church.*

What is so very cool has been this summer’s story of unchurched Bridging Team leaders visiting congregations – including Greenwood - to talk about what they’ve discovered in the midst of a safe, non-judgemental, circle of strangers who become friends and “neighbours”.

I wonder - if we stripped away all the hymns and symbols and hidden rules of the sub-culture we call Greenwood – what would be left? At our “naked” best, we are a community bound by stories. Trusting in our own deepest experience, we have found a safe place to share sorrows, laughter, joys and struggles. We journey together. We ask questions. We examine our dominant culture in the light of those pushed to its margins.

We lift up our differences as paths towards deeper understanding. And we discover what's our most precious common gift.

I look forward to another season of worship. Singing old songs and new. Celebrating with ancient ritual how history repeats itself. Telling old stories as guides to tough decisions we humbly make in the presence of ancestors, angels, and the ever-present, ever-loving, ever-changing, eternal Spirit.

## ASK MARY

Twenty years ago when I was a newcomer to our church I needed some information so I asked someone. Their answer was 'ask Mary'. So I did and I got my answer. The last time I 'asked Mary' was this past August and she shared her memories with me. Mary Hinan Grose's father, Stan Wood, donated the land for our church in the early 60's. We know that Mary's role within the church started with the very beginning. Since that time Mary has played many roles within our church. My best memory of Mary happened in 2012 when I chaired the Renovation Committee to make the changes to the Sanctuary. There were lots of ideas but we needed decisions. Mary and Shirley Lannen took on the responsibility of choosing the flooring and ordering the furniture – very important decisions and they chose wisely

I invited some of our long time members to share their thoughts.

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A couple of things that come to mind - Mary directed the choir for a number of years - for some of that time while Shirley played the organ. Later Shirley took on directing as well. Mary's parents, Stanley and Jean Wood had the farm at the top of the hill, - the house north of the church was the farmhouse. Her parents built a bungalow across the road on what became Orchard Crescent. Mary and first husband, Joe Hinan, directed our baseball teams in the Church League, The teams played at our backstop for many years, giving youngsters from the area good access to well organized sport.

Mary worked long and hard for the UCW - there were Christmas Teas with the then-popular fruitcake made by the women, directed by Mary.

Never a dinner was put on that Mary didn't organize a telephone group to sell the tickets and then she worked at the dinner. Mary always organized the setting of the tables - the men did the job, but needed direction - then the men served the food. Much laughter occurred in all this organizing.

After my many years at the church, I still have to 'ask Mary' a number of things each year.

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More than baseball was important in Mary's ministry with children. Mary led the youngsters in the Junior Choir with the same passion she brought to the senior choir. The children were dedicated and keen to sing, even if some weren't always "in key". Naomi, my daughter, was an inquisitive child and often asked Mary what certain words meant in the hymns. Mary, with great patience, would go home, research the hymn, and always come back with an answer for Naomi. I think, like the children, Mary has a great thirst for knowledge which she shares with others. As a baseball coach, she taught the children more than the skills to play ball, They learned about fair play, acceptance of others, and being a good sport, whether you won or lost. Some of those players went on to coach for Donwood - Nicole Joore and our daughter Naomi. I am sure there were others who played on the Donwood teams as young children, and then moved on to welcoming and coaching new young players, sharing the skills Mary had taught them. Another family memory we have is the camping excursions to Emily Park or Serpent Mounds. Mary was instrumental in organizing these camping week-ends. Not only did Mary organize these events, but every year at camp she and Joe hosted the children for a pancake breakfast as we parents sat and

enjoyed coffee at our own campsites! Children are an integral part of our lives, and Mary's recognition and support of the young members of this Donwood community have always been appreciated.

I greatly appreciate the time and devotion Mary gave to the sport, and more importantly to the children she coached in so many positive ways.

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I love the title of this piece "Ask Mary" because it captures my experience. Back when I first started as your Minister, this was most often the refrain I'd hear in response to my many questions.

I also really appreciate how Mary participates as part of the Choir "team". She obviously puts her "all" into each piece of music. Her enjoyment adds to my own.

As Council Chair, I appreciated how she kept us on track and moves us through our agendas.

It was only later - when I learned of her background as a sports Coach - that explained it.

The Peterborough Sports Community has clearly been the beneficiary of many years of hard work and dedication by Mary Hinan Grose. Mary played in the Women's City Softball League for 14 years, winning the championship four times. She also organized, coached and served as Convener in the Community Church Softball League for several years.

Nevertheless, it is in the sport of curling where Mary truly made her greatest contribution.

After joining the Peterborough Curling Club in 1959, she worked on the Centennial Committee in 1976, the Canadian Senior Championship Committee in 1988, and was Chairperson for curling in the Ontario Winter Games in 1988. Her ability to organize and run events smoothly, earned her the nickname, 'Sergeant Mary'.

As a certified Level 2 Instructor/Coach, Mary conducted numerous clinics at the Peterborough Curling Club and other area rinks. She served as a Provincial Course Instructor, teaching across Ontario. Mary coached curling at Sir Sandford Fleming College beginning in 1977 and was presented with the Honorary Knight Award in 1996-97 for her commitment and dedication to athletics at Fleming College.

She became a certified Level 3 Umpire with the Canadian Curling Association. She has also participated in provincial curling competitions, reaching the finals in Tankard play, and skipped one of the teams on the winning Peterborough Curling Club Tankard Team in 1973. Her induction into the Peterborough & District Sports Hall of Fame was a fitting testimony to her devotion to local sports.

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Music has always been an important part of Greenwood United, and who started it all, - Mary Wood Hinan-Grose! Through Mary, organists, (Jean Drimmie and Vince Abrahamse to name two) came on board to assist in musical leadership. Church members and others were invited to form a choir and in no time, there was both a senior and a junior choir.

Mary developed a very strong music program but organists retire or move on so Mary recruited, or stole, as they said at St. James United, her cousin Shirley Lannen to become organist. Together, under Mary's very capable organization and direction, the choir performed, for adjudication at the Peterborough Music Festival, and always scored well. Mary undertook having the choirs perform Christmas and Easter Cantatas, often works of

considerable difficulty. This became an annual event with musical guests added such as additional voices and instruments like violins and trumpet. For many years, Mary worked hard to bring excellence to the music program, through decisive, unfaltering direction and excellent choice of music. With Mary at the helm, Donwood became known for its music program throughout the city. Mary's legacy of a top notch choir music program will always be one of the strong and enduring features of Greenwood United Church. Although now retired from Choir Direction for many years, a strong faith and love of her church has kept Mary in the alto section of the choir.

Our Nuc Hive (East Hive that started with 4 frames with a Queen and Brood) is doing well too, although not as strong as our Swarm Hive. We have pulled our capped honey frames on September 6<sup>th</sup> and the honey extracting will be done September 13<sup>th</sup>. We will bottle our honey the following week. In the meantime, we will treat both Hives for Mites for 42 days and then plan to put them to bed for the Winter in late October. We hope that our Bees will stay strong through the Winter.
