**From Reverend Bill Peacock:** As Greenwood's Voluntary Associate Minister (VAM) ordained by the United Church of Canada in 1977. I was actually fairly new to the United Church, having returned to the church of my childhood after decades of no involvement. At the ordination service it is declared that we are ordained to Word (preaching), Sacrament (baptism and communion) and Pastoral Care. Throughout my ministry this part has taken on many different meanings. Working in a larger church with youth ministry as its focus, in multi-point charges where folks may work easily together or be in constant tension. With Greenwood, it's a unique combination of a smaller church and what has often been seen as an inner city ministry with people who have been disenfranchised and others who look once again at their privilege, as well as being a Bee church, there are even more unique opportunities to express ourselves. As the former minister at Fairview I see my role as an opportunity to assist in the continuing integration and welcoming of all peoples to Greenwood, while at the same time, participate in worship when called upon and reach out in the sharing of the good news of God's love.



The fall season and Remembrance Day has always been especially close to my heart. The back corner of The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 258 was where I discovered many people who just needed someone to listen to their story or the pain they had been carrying. It was here that I witnessed the power of just listening to a veteran, even with my young ears, it could afford an opportunity to share the burden they carried and the struggles they faced as they looked back on their youth that was so compromised by war and a call to service.
