A Bee Story

A quiet Sunday afternoon became exciting, very quickly. The Greenwood Beekeepers had been feeling pretty frustrated and sad that we lost our bees this past Winter. I had tried to find some bees but since so many local Beekeepers had lost many of their hives this past Winter, I had been unsuccessful. I had noticed on Facebook that Quentin Day, who had given the Ecology Garden Beekeeping course to the Greenwood Beekeepers a

number of years ago, was doing well beewise. I reached out to Quentin and asked if he had any bees that he could sell us. He said that he didn't at the time but that he would keep us in mind. On Sunday, May 29th, 2022 I received a message from him that he had found two swarms of Bees near his Hives. He and another Beekeeper, Mike had caught the one swarm but they had run out of equipment to catch the other. He offered to try to catch the other swarm for us, if I brought a bee box for him to use. By the time that I arrived, Mike had left and twice they had been unsuccessful in catching the second swarm. The trick is to catch the queen and the rest of the bees will stay. It sounds like they hadn't been able to catch the queen. The swarm had moved to a lower location on the apple tree and we realized that we could reach the swarm from the ground. Quentin held the bee box while I clipped the three branches holding the swarm. It dropped into the box and we were able to shake the bees off of the branches and put the lid on the box. Now the trick was to get the remaining bees that were at the box entrance inside so that I could duct tape it closed. Quentin had to leave and I patiently waited for most of the bees to go in the box. I placed the box in the trunk of my car and contacted our mentor, Ahmad, to meet me at Greenwood to assist in settling our new bees. We got the hive set up and they seemed quite calm. The next day, I fed them sugar water and they seem to be doing well. We are so grateful to Quentin and Ahmad for their help .Quentin has told me to “stand by” so I may be getting another call that he has found another swarm for us.

Outreach Committee (our newest committee)

Mary Gordon: I have been a member of the United Church of Canada from infant baptism to now, although there have been gaps in my attendance over the years. I taught Sunday school, sang in choirs, led services through CGIT (Canadian Girls in Training),

participated in the church revolution of the 1960s through YPUC (Young Peoples United Church), and served on every standing committee, except for Trustees. I joined the Nominations Committee last year so that I could get to know more members, and the Outreach Task Team because my Methodist ancestors keep prodding me to do more. And this year, I put my hand up for the Board of Trustees, just because it was the missing piece in my portfolio. Prior to joining Greenwood, I was a member at George Street United, and one of the founders of Seeds of Change, a partnership with the community.

I raised two sons on my own, and am now married to Joan Moriarty. I have had two full careers - first in mainstream media (radio, television, newspapers, and CBC) and then with the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources, working in the Indigenous Policy Unit. I retired in 2011.

Raye Flatt: Hello, my name is Raye and no, my Dad did not want a boy. I grew up and had the majority of my schooling in four different army camps, I was a tomboy, loved playing football, tackle of course, much to my Dad's dismay. I was captain of the girls' basketball team, our tallest player was 5 ft 8 inches but still we came in second at the Winnipeg round robin. For two years in Shilo, Manitoba I was sure that I was supposed to go to the Catholic Church, but it didn't happen. I have lived in the Kawarthas for 70 years. I attended church off and on and only got really involved 10 years ago at Fairview Church with Bill Peacock.

Anne Wilson: I joined the Outreach Committee because I am interested in charities locally and around the world. This has enabled me to work with a dynamic group of people on the Outreach Committee who are interested in helping others. I have learned about some charities that I didn't even realize existed. There is such a need and if we are able to help a few it will give me great satisfaction. I realize that this ability will vary from year to year, depending on the revenue (or lack of) from the Greenwood investments.

Lynn Jonderville: I began working on the Outreach Fund Committee at Trinity-St. Paul's in Toronto many years ago. As at Greenwood, it had its origins in the investment income from the sale of a church building after amalgamation. The original mandate was ambitious - applications for funding were accepted from both local and global partners. Projects that might otherwise have difficulty securing funding were given priority. The evaluation of projects and the follow-up reporting requirements were challenging to say the least. Over time it was realized that we didn't have the capacity to do this work effectively. The mandate changed to focus on local projects, with preference given to those aligned with our mission priorities. Local projects offer opportunities for engagement by members of the congregation and reporting usually takes the form of an in-person presentation during worship.

Joyce Fee: I put my hand up for this committee because I know that our best way to live is to help others. There are many ways to do this - sharing time, helping hands, listening ears, as well as financial assistance. Our committee is comprised of a member from each of Fairview, Donwood, St Matthews and Greenwood congregations. Our goal is to select one charity from each of the five categories that have been established in the Outreach policy.
